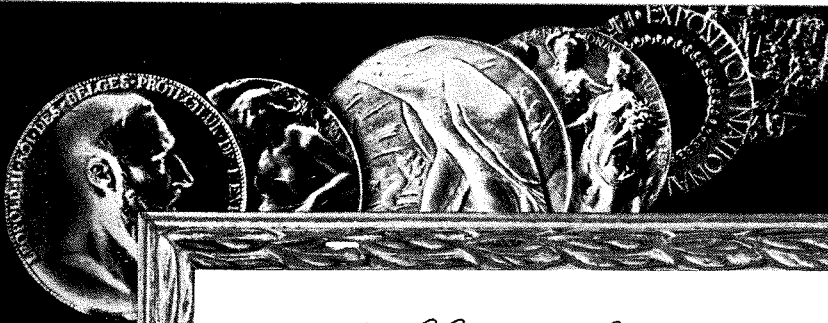

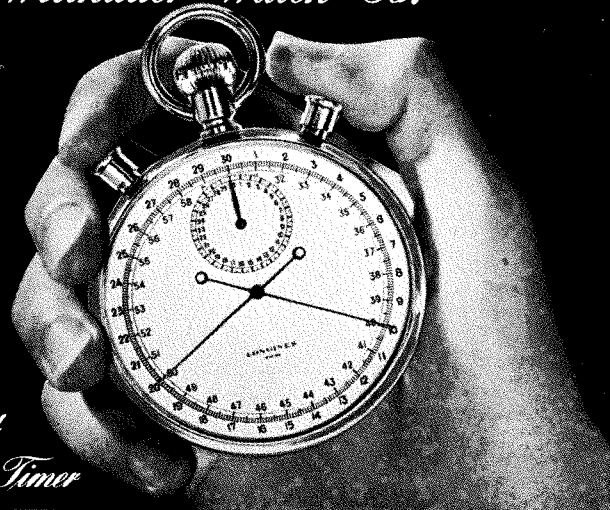

Western Conference Track Coaches



GEORGE T. BRESNAHAN became track coach at the University of Iowa in 1921 where he has turned out a great number of championship performers, nine of whom have won places on United States Olympic teams. Coach Bresnahan attended the University of Wisconsin where he competed in track. After serving in the war he returned to Wisconsin as assistant coach before going to Iowa.

LEO T. JOHNSON became head track coach at Illinois in September, 1937, after a long service as director of athletics and coach at Millikin University. A native of Carlyle, Illinois, Johnson won letters in football, track, basketball, and baseball at Millikin. He was an all-conference halfback selection for three years. His undergraduate career was interrupted by the World War, from which he was mustered out as a first lieutenant.



JAMES KELLY, University of Minnesota track coach, was for many years the athletic director at DePaul University, Chicago. Coach Kelly took over the track and field squads at Minnesota in 1937 and since that time has brought about a steady improvement in Gopher teams. Together with Frank G. McCormick, Minnesota athletic director, Kelly was instrumental in bringing the 1938, 1940, and 1946 National Collegiate championships to Minnesota.

J. KENNETH DOHERTY is serving his seventh year as track and field coach at the University of Michigan. He succeeded Charles B. Hoyt who resigned to accept a similar position at Yale. Mr. Doherty was graduated from Wayne University in 1927 and received an M.A. degree from Michigan in 1933. He went from Michigan to Princeton where he served as assistant track coach for several years before returning to Michigan.



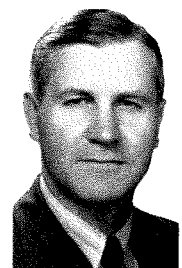
TOM JONES has been associated with the athletic department of the University of Wisconsin since 1912. During that period he has held the head track coach's job continuously up to the present day. During this period he developed thirteen Big Ten cross country team winners, six indoor conference championship track teams, and three outdoor championship teams. He served as athletic director from 1916 to 1925.

FRANK HILL, Northwestern track coach, is serving his 26th year with the Wildcats. He assumed the position in 1921. Hill is a native of Chicago, having attended Armour Institute where he competed in football and track. He later took up boxing as a member of the Chicago Athletic Association team and also competed on famed C.A.A. track teams. At outbreak of World War I, Hill was appointed track and field coach at Great Lakes.



LAURENCE N. SNYDER returned last year as Ohio State track coach after three years' leave of absence to serve in the Navy. He had served in the Air Corps in World War I. As an undergraduate, Snyder competed in five events and set Ohio State records in the hurdles, high jump, and broad jump. He captained the Buckeyes in 1924 and 1925. Snyder has been on the Ohio coaching staff since 1925 and became head coach in 1932.

GORDON R. FISHER became head track coach at Indiana University in July, 1944, succeeding the late E. C. "Billy" Hayes. Prior to that time Fisher had been head football and track coach at North Central College, Naperville, Ill. At North Central Fisher produced five conference championship track teams and 12 men who hold college individual and medley relay records. Fisher served in the Navy in World War I.



DAVE RANKIN, Purdue's youthful new head track coach, had a distinguished athletic career at the Boiler-maker institution before his graduation in 1941. He won All-American honors and three major letters as an end in football and captained the 1940 Boiler-maker eleven. In addition, he was one of the ranking middle western collegiate hurdlers and at one time was co-holder of the world's record for the 60-yard lows indoors.

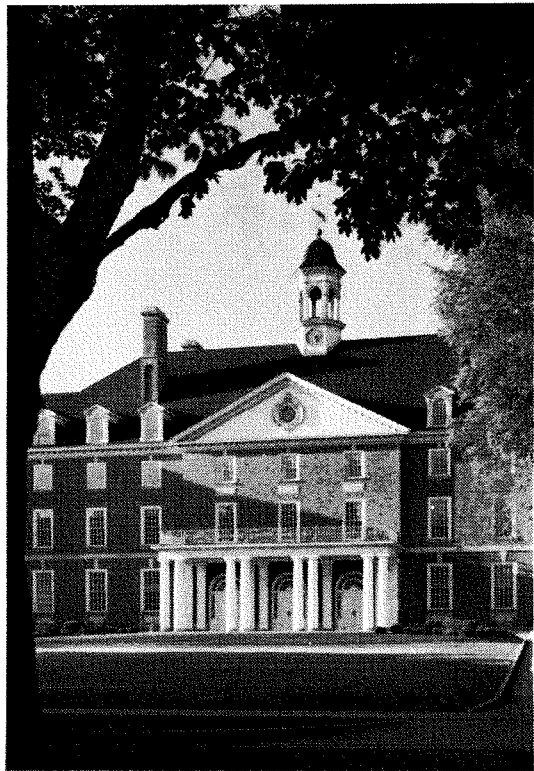

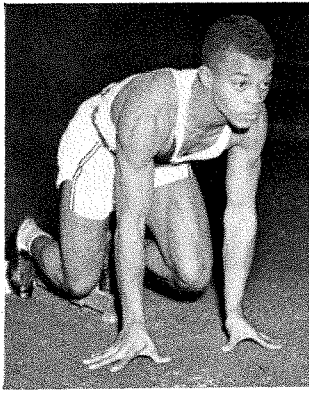

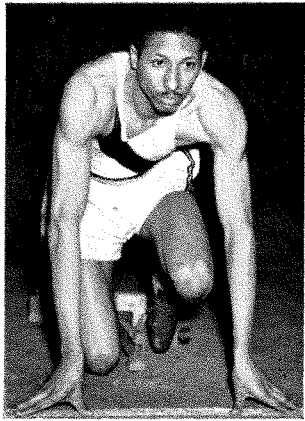

Facts About the Illinois Armory

THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS ARMORY, for the first time site of the Western Conference Track and Field Championships, is excellently suited for a meet of this nature.

Construction for the Armory building proper was begun in 1912 and completed, as one large area in 1913. This is the interior area used today for the track and field competition. In 1925, the building was enlarged to its present size, with second-story offices, drill and lecture rooms.

Seating capacity of the Armory for most track meets is 3,000, but for larger events additional bleachers can be installed raising the total to more than 5,000.

This is the first major track and field event held in Illinois Armory since the 17th Annual Illinois Relay Carnival in 1941. For many years, this Relay Carnival

ranked as one of the nation's greatest indoor track meets. It was discontinued during the war years.

Area of the soil portion in the Armory on which track and field are laid out is 4,560 square yards. In center of the infield is a 75-yard straightaway, and a 260-yard track circles the concrete apron.

On the Armory track, 6.77 laps constitute one mile, 3.38 laps the 880, and 1.69 laps the quarter-mile. Layout of the track provides 132.6 yards of straightaways, 66.3 yards on each side, and 127.4 yards in curves, 63.7 yards to each curve.

The 60-yard dash, 70-yard high and low hurdles events are run on the straightaway in center of the infield. All other running events take place on the outer track. Pits for the broad jump, running high jump, and pole vault, plus area for the shot put are located at sides of the straightaway.

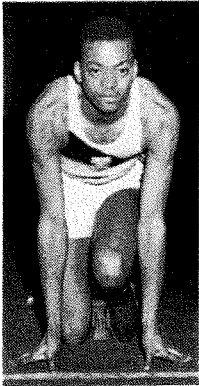

Post-War Lag

Produces Great Championship Field

By KENNETH L. WILSON

AS A TRACK FAN of long standing I have followed with great interest dual meet and other performances of the indoor season leading up to the Conference championships.

I cannot recall when there has been a field with such over-all strength as we have this year. We have record breakers and potential record breakers in more than usual numbers. But more than that there is in almost every event a host of men who can really be called outstanding.

In the shot put, for instance, we have at least four men over 50 feet, which was a phenomenal distance for many years. In the high jump there must be a dozen who have gone better than 6' 2". In almost all of the running events there are from four to eight whose times might have won Conference meets in a majority of the last twenty years.

I have, of course, tried to determine why we should have such a remarkable field in this particular year. There comes to mind immediately that we have a collection of some of the best men from the last six years who have returned to finish their educations and to compete. That, as I remarked at the time of the outdoor meet last year, is an inspiring thought and it is gratifying to see how those men have stayed with their sport and have improved their performances. There is also the fact that when there are a few extraordinary performers, as we have, they "bring along" their teammates and competitors not only in their own events but in others.

One other influence occurs to me as being of possibly even greater importance, however remote it might appear on the surface. I have talked with enough of these boys to know that the Olympic Games, coming up next year, are very much on their minds, and that each of them holds it among his most cherished ambitions to compete.

It is scarcely an original observation that these are critical times in all fields of human activity. It is interesting to note how greatly we are indebted to the Olympic Games, to which we are already looking forward.

In the broad field of international affairs the Olympic Games afford an opportunity for expression of nationalism, but under conditions of fair, equal competition governed by true spirit of brotherhood of man which is embodied in the code of sportsmanship.

In the relatively limited field of intercollegiate athletics we feel the influence of the Olympics which stress and will not compromise with fundamental principles which we value most highly. There is, of course, that first principle that competition shall be open to all, regardless of race or creed, who qualify according to standards of their institution.

Those standards include the principle of amateurism, adherence to which is a common purpose of the Olympics and of our intercollegiate games. In an age of materialism the Olympic Games, the supreme competitive test of the amateur sportsman, serve immeasurably to emphasize the importance of the amateur ideal and to foster an appreciation of it.
