




Finally I wish to express my profound gratitude on behalf of the Supreme Council for Sport in Africa and the Continent, to His Excellency the President, and the Government of the United States, to the Amateur Athletic Union, to the People of America, and to all American Ambassadors in Africa for their contributions to make this event a success.

MEET COORDINATOR

The man who deserves much of the credit for bringing the Pan-Africa/USA International Track Meet into existence and to Wallace Wade Stadium is no stranger to track fans throughout the world.

Not content with merely bringing track success to North Carolina Central University in Durham, where he has been track coach and head of the Department of Physical Education and Recreation since 1945, Dr. Leroy T. Walker has carried his knowledge and experience around the nation and around the world. Among the nations which have benefited directly from his talents are Lebanon, Syria, Israel, Ethiopia, Haiti, Trinidad and Jamaica.

A native of Atlanta, Ga., Dr. Walker graduated from Benedict College in Columbia, S.C., in 1940. After a year's study resulting in an M.A. from Columbia University, he returned to his alma mater and served as head of the Physical Education Department and coached football, basketball and track. Similar positions at Bishop College in Marshall, Tex., and Prairie View (Tex.) College followed.

Dr. Walker came to Central in 1945 and Durham has never let him get away.

A PhD degree from New York University, awarded in 1957, was the climax of his professional preparation. A prolific writer, Dr. Walker is the author of three books: A Manual in Adapted Physical Education, Physical Education for the Exceptional Student and Championship Techniques in Track and Field.

Among the many great athletes trained by Dr. Walker are Olympic medalists Lee Calhoun, Ed Roberts and Norm Tate.

MEET DIRECTOR

When one speaks of track in North Carolina, the name of Al Buehler can't be far behind.

Head track coach at Duke since 1966 and across country mentor for the past 16 years, Buehler has been an active participant in the development of track in the Tarheel State and throughout the nation.


The Philadelphia, Pa., native, who starred as a distance runner at Maryland, is past president of the U.S. Track Coaches Association and will serve as manager of the 1971 U.S. Pan American Games team. He also is a nominee for both assistant coach and head manager for the 1972 U.S. Olympic team.

Buehler was graduated from Maryland in 1952 and received his Master's degree from the University of North Carolina in 1958.

His Blue Devil cross country teams have won three Atlantic Coast Conference championships, including the 1970 crown.

A valuable asset to the Blue Devil program, assistant coach Walt Cleary also is playing a major role in this meet, aiding Buehler as assistant meet director.

MEET THE COACHES



FRANCIS

ALEX FRANCIS, Head Coach

Fort Hays State's head track and cross country coach, Alex Francis, is making his 24th year as a member of the FHS faculty this fall.


The head mentor is a member of the NAIA Track and Field Hall of Fame and served as the first president of the NAIA Track and Field Coaches Assn.

Internationally known in track and field circles, the Dunbar, Neb., native was head coach of the United States and Western Hemisphere teams competing in Europe last summer.

He coached the Pan American Games in 1967 at Winnipeg, Canada, and was honored as one of the U.S. Olympic coaches at Lake Tahoe for the 1968 American track and field

This year, Francis will be head coach of the Pan American Games at Cali, Colombia, in South America.

Francis has been selected by NAIA as District 10, Area III Coach of the Year in 1971.



MOOBERRY

JACK MOOBERRY, Assistant Coach

Dean of track and field coaches in the Pacific 8, Jack Mooberry begins his 26th campaign at Washington State being named one of the coaches for the 1971 Pan-American games to be held in Cali, Colombia, this fall.

Mooberry has been at Washington State as head coach since 1946, and prior to that he had a four-year stand here as one of the Northwest's finest sprinters. Under Mooberry, WSU has had NCAA All-Americas 57 times and his second place finish in 1968 was the highest ever by a Cougar team.

In 1968 Mooberry was chosen as the first track and field coach of the year by members of the USTFF and USTCA.

In his 26 seasons at Washington State Mooberry has piled up an impressive record of 105 wins to 45 losses and one tie in dual meet competition. Under his leadership the Cougars have had 30 individual conference champions.



CALHOUN

LEE CALHOUN, Assistant Coach

Lee Calhoun, Olympic gold medal winner and one of America's all-time great track performers, is an assistant track coach at Yale under head coach Bob Giegengack.

Calhoun came to Yale from Grambling College, where he had served in the dual capacity of physical education instructor and head track coach.

An Indiana native, Calhoun was graduated from Roosevelt H.S. in Gary and was awarded a bachelor of science degree from North Carolina College in 1957.

So strong were Calhoun's competitive performances that he still holds world records in the 50, 60, 70 and 120-yard high hurdles, the last in 13.2. He was a gold medal winner in the 120-yard event in both the 1956 and 1960 Olympic games.

During his career, Calhoun annexed seven national championships and innumerable international titles. He was elected to the Helms Sports Hall of Fame.


