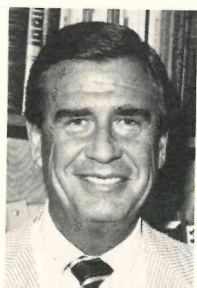

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# Staking a Claim for Gold



**FRANCIE LARRIEU, Thinking of Montreal**

How good is the cast for tonight's 17th annual Sunkist Invitational track and field meet? Let's put it this way: There's a potential Olympic champion in every event.

From Steve Williams, Don Quarrie and Houston McTear in the sprints to Frank Shorter in the two mile, there is an array of talent which figures to be right there in the rush for gold at Montreal.

Williams, co-world record holder in the 100 meters, and Quarrie, world record holder at both 200 meters and 200 yards, were the men to beat last year, but young Mr. McTear had them looking over their shoulders. In fact, the Florida schoolboy, after equaling the world 100-yard dash record of 9.0, finished ahead of Quarrie the first two times they met in the 100.

McTear will be pushing even harder this year. He'll have to, because the lineup at Montreal could be the swiftest in history featuring defending champion Valeriy Borzov of the Soviet Union and Pan American Games champion Silvio Leonard of Cuba. Some awfully fast people are going to wind up without a medal.

In the 400 meters, Maurice Peoples promises to return to the form that won him National AAU titles in 1973 and 1974. He still claims the fastest relay lap ever run, an incredible 43.4 in the 1973 NCAA championships at Baton Rouge.

Rick Wohlhuter, Mike Boit and Mark Enyeart all have a shot in the 800 meters, and Boit could be the sleeper in the 1,500. The durable Kenyan was a place-winner in both events at Munich, and he's coming off his greatest campaign ever. In Europe, he ran the 800 in 1:43.8, only one-tenth of a second off the world record.

In the 5,000 meters, Marty Liquori could surprise a lot of people if he decides to step up from the 1,500. He won the

National AAU 5,000 last year at Eugene and later beat some of Europe's best over longer distances on the continent.

Frank Shorter will try to become the first man since Emil Zatopek to win both the 10,000 meters and the marathon in one Olympics. He is the defending champion in the marathon but will gear his training more to the shorter distance at Montreal.

Strictly a longshot in the high hurdles is Jerry Wilson, but the former USC star certainly can't be dismissed after his victory in the 1975 AAU championships. His time of 13.48 was the second fastest electrical clocking of the year. France's Guy Drut, who fell down in the AAU meet, was the leader at 13.38.

In the field events, potential Olympic champions include Dwight Stones, Tom Woods and Rory Kotinek in the high jump, Dave Roberts, Earl Bell and Dar Ripley in the pole vault, Randy Williams, Arnie Robinson and Bouncy Moore in the long jump and Al Feuerbach, Britain's Geoff Capes and Sweden's Hans Hoglund in the shot put.

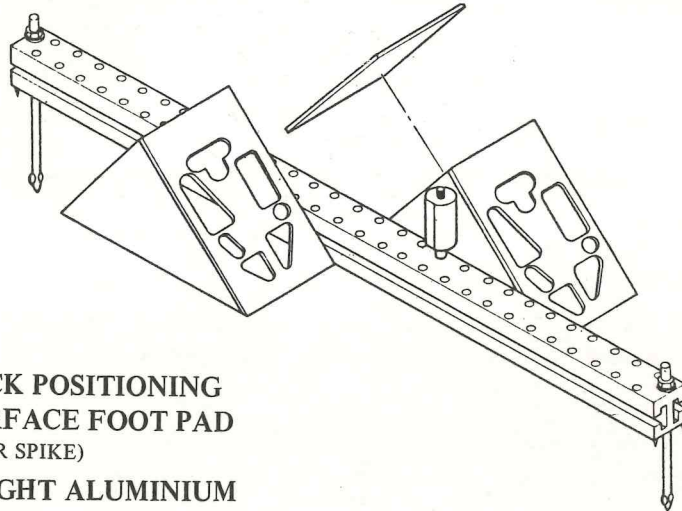
In the last year's Sunkist meet, Stones and Ripley set world indoor records but neither is a cinch tonight. Stones was upset by both Woods and Kotinek in last year's AAU and Ripley lost out to Bell in the NCAA although both cleared 18-1. Roberts, of course, surpassed everybody with a world outdoor record of 18-6½.

Oh, we almost forgot. There's a gal named Francie Larrieu who figures to be in the picture in the women's 1,500 meters and there are three entries in tonight's 600 who will be doing damage on other fronts at Montreal. They are intermediate hurdlers Jim Bolding and Ralph Mann and the world record holder in the decathlon, Bruce Jenner.

Quite a cast.

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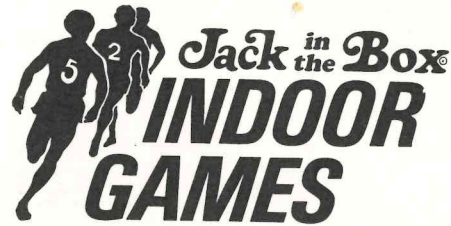
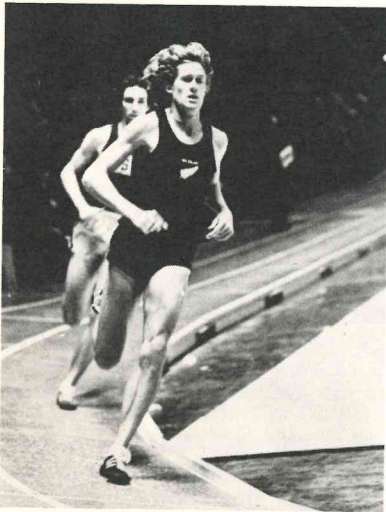

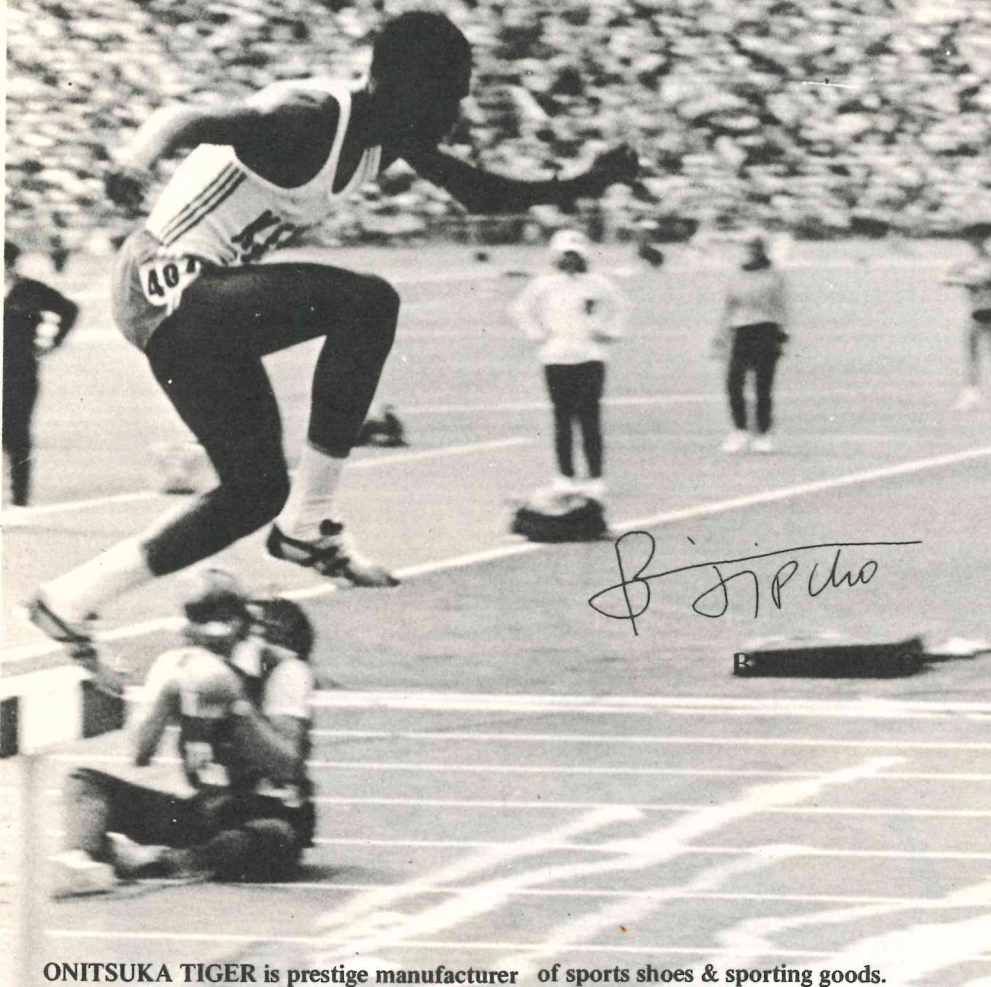
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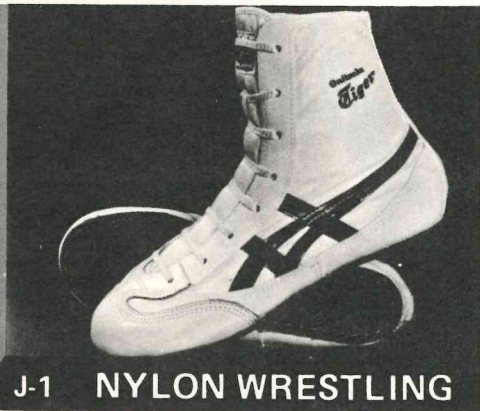
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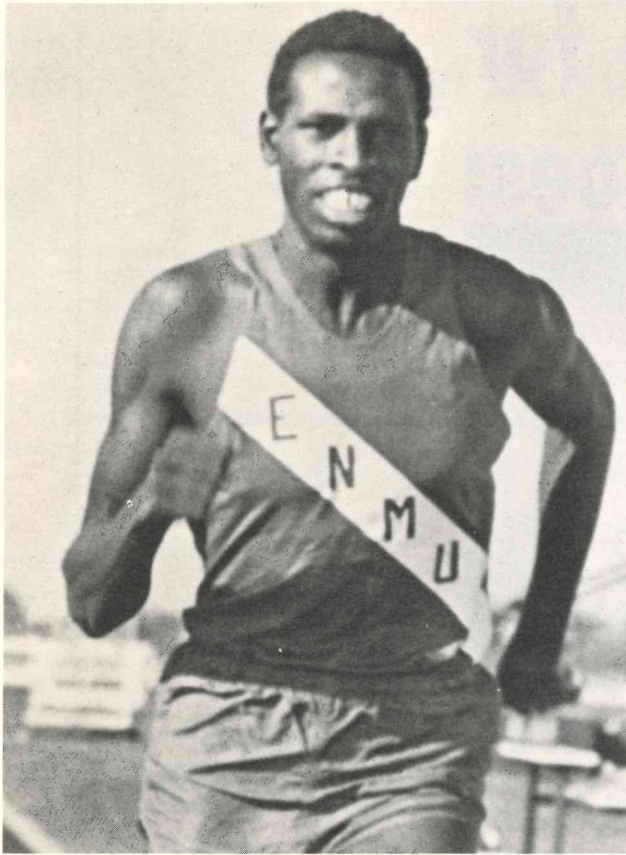
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# The Half Mile is Heating Up

## Something Old...

At the age of 27, Mike Boit has been around a while. But it's been a fight for recognition.

The native Kenyan who attends Eastern New Mexico College is one of the two or three greatest runners in the world. Yet his name draws a blank in most quarters. As a matter of fact he may become a trivia question in the near future.

For those who may need some jostling, Boit finished third in the 800 meters and fourth in the 1500 meters at the Munich Olympics.

He probably is the man to beat at 800 in the upcoming Montreal Olympics.

Last year he ran the second fastest 800 meters in history with a 1:43.8 clocking at Zurich, Switzerland.

During a really brilliant summer Boit proved to be the top man in head-to-head confrontations with Luciano Susanj of Yugoslavia and Rick Wohlhuter of the Chicago Track Club.

Boit also cruised a lifetime best of 3:54.9 in the mile just in case anyone forgets his other talents.

He'll be competing tonight in either the 880 or mile.

If he opts for the 880, National AAU champion Mark Enyeart and Wohlhuter are on hand to give him solid competition.

Should he try the mile, he'll run into Marty Liquori, South Africa's Danie Malan, indoor record-holder Tony Waldrop, Wilson Waigwa of Texas El Paso and Scott Daggatt of Oregon.

Whichever he runs, Mike Boit will be the man to beat. He has the ability to set the hot pace or run from behind. And nothing distracts him.

Wohlhuter was ranked No. 1 in the world in 1974 over two laps and properly so. He not only won, but he set a world record of 1:44.1 for the 880.

But last summer Boit whipped Wohlhuter six straight times. He also handled 3:49.4 miler John Walker of New Zealand at 800 meters. Walker is regarded as a potential two event man at Montreal.

At any rate, don't let the lack of publicity fool you.

Mike Boit is a man to be reckoned with in the Sunkist meet and the upcoming Montreal Olympics.

## Something New...

Mark Enyeart is a guy on the rise.

A year ago at this time, only his closest friends knew about his budding track career.

But the ensuing 12 months signaled an explosion for young Mark, who will compete in his first Sunkist Invitational tonight.

A sprinter as a high school boy in tiny Vernal, Utah, Enyeart moved to the 440 at Utah State and achieved a commendable 46.3 clocking.

His coach, Ralph Maughan, reasoned that Enyeart might show even greater promise at 880 yards. And Maughan convinced Enyeart to give it a try.

In rapid-fire order, Enyeart won the NCAA indoor championship, the California Relays at Modesto, the NCAA outdoor title at Provo, Utah, the Meet of Champions at Berkeley and finally the National AAU at Eugene, Ore.

Until an injury hit him on a European tour, Enyeart never lost a final in either the 880 yards or 800 meters.

His most spectacular victory, of course, was at the expense of world record-holder Rick Wohlhuter of the Chicago Track Club. It was at Eugene.

Wohlhuter certainly was aware of the 21-year-old upstart from the Rocky Mountains. But he certainly didn't expect what he got.

Enyeart sped the first lap in 51.1 seconds, normal for him but a little too hot for Wohlhuter.

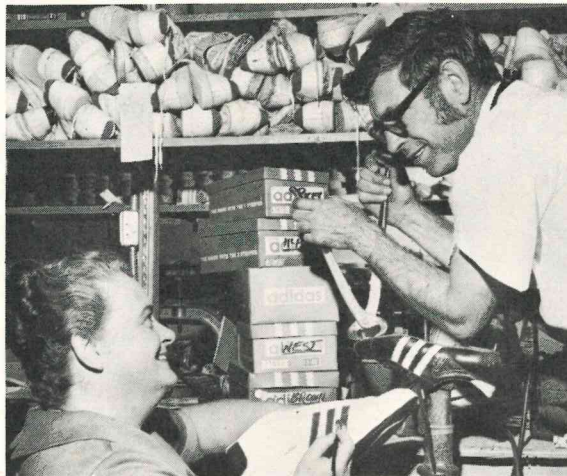
Most experts still expected Wohlhuter to take the measure of the collegian on the second lap, but Enyeart refused to wilt. He held off Wohlhuter on the turn and into the home stretch. While the crowd howled its appreciation, Enyeart literally made Wohlhuter quit in the final strides.

He hit the tape in a brilliant 1:44.9 far and away the best clocking of his relatively short career.

"I was surprised at the win", Enyeart admitted. "And I think Wohlhuter was surprised too. I think he underestimated the field, and he'll be ready for it the next time, I'm sure."

The next time is tonight. Yes, Wohlhuter will be ready. But will he be able to win?

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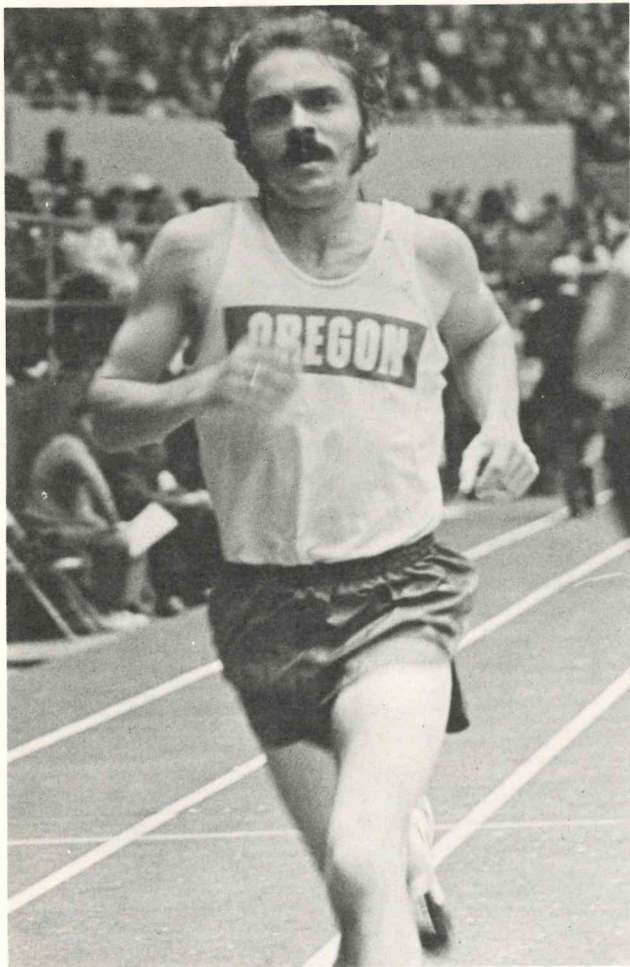
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# PRE...Only the Best was Good Enough

Steve Prefontaine was the track promoter's dream.

He was the guy who would promise the media a fast race, and always produced it.

Pre was the athlete who wasn't satisfied just to win: he wanted to win in record time.

His personality was ideal for an athlete consistently in demand by the media. He loved to talk to the press, and he never ducked a question, no matter how controversial it might be.

Steve was full of fun. He sampled a lot of life in his short years.

But, like all of us, he had problems. I was with Steve and his beautiful girl friend, Kris, at the Modesto Relays just a few days before the auto accident that claimed his life. He sat and talked about many problems.

He was worried about raising enough money to finance the sandwich bar he dreamed of owning in track-crazy Eugene, he wondered what to say to a lucrative pro offer, he was concerned he hadn't lived up to his expectations on a trip to Europe the past summer, he was wondering if another Olympics was worth the effort.

Selfishly, you remember that Steve never did less than his best in any race you promoted. There was no worry about a "rabbit". Steve would go all out from the gun.

The crowd empathized with him for that. You remember Steve closing in on a world or American record with 13,000 rooting themselves hoarse.

I think most promoters would agree that Steve was the biggest draw in American track. He was like a Muhammad Ali in that he produced everything he said he would.

It took him a long time to get over the disappointment of a fourth-place finish in the 5000 at Munich. He had been so confident he was ready to win it all.

But get over it he did, and he proceeded to run even faster. His name is so prominent in the record book.

Steve was warm and friendly, the type you loved having as a house guest. He stayed with us several times, and our lives were always enriched by his presence. It is so difficult to realize he isn't around tonight.

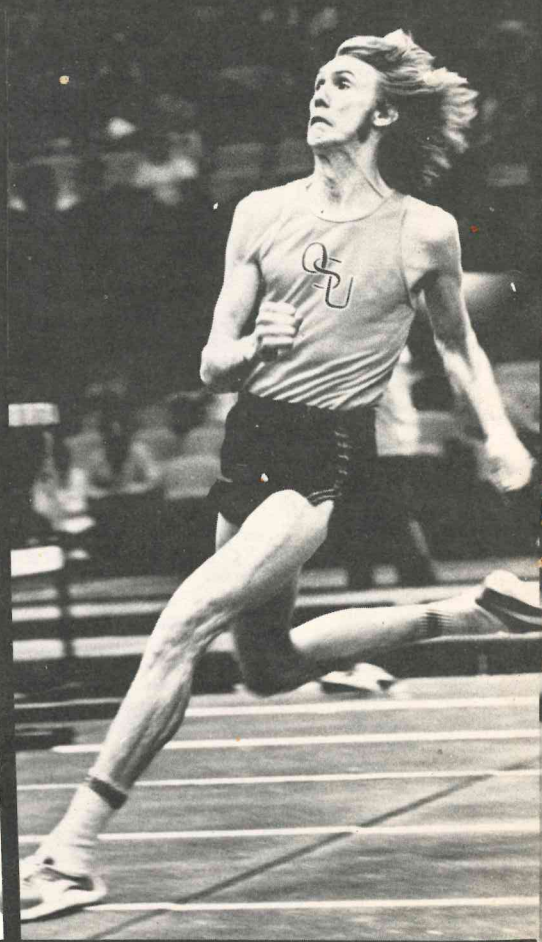

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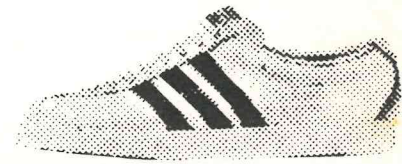
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# To the Swift

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Nothing gets a track fan into a bigger tizzy than a sizzling sprint.

Not the mile, not the hurdles, not the pole vault. True, they all can be exciting, but the fast dash always has been the supreme crowd-pleaser.

Tonight the greatest field of sprinters ever assembled for an indoor meet will contest issues at both 50 and 60 yards en route to the ultimate showdown in the Olympic Games at Montreal.

For openers there's the spectacular Russian champion Valeriy Borzov, who claimed the gold medal in both the 100 and 200 meters in the 1972 Munich Olympics.

Borzov has clocked 10.0 and 20.0 in the two outdoor dashes. But he also is a superb indoor sprinter too.

Lining up against the ace Russian will be San Diego's Steve Williams, the No. 1 sprinter in the world in 1973, Jamaica's Don Quarrie, the National AAU 100 and 200 king, and Florida prep sensation Houston McTear.

All are world record-holders!

Williams has run 9.9 for 100 meters three times. Quarrie has owned a share of the world 200 meter record at 19.8 since 1971. He also ran 220 yards in 19.9 last May. McTear, of course, joined Ivory Crockett as the only man ever to clock 9.0 for 100 yards.

Williams and Borzov have been "Paper Rivals" for four years. Steve suffered an injury in 1972 and didn't make it to Munich. Then in 1973 Williams embarrassed an out-of-shape Borzov in the USA-USSR dual meet.

Other than that, the two haven't gotten together.

Quarrie is another who missed out at Munich due to injuries. But he has come back with a bang and ranks as a favorite at 200 meters. He also demonstrated his sprint versatility by whipping a top field at the 100 in the National AAU meet at Eugene, Ore.

Although still a high school boy in Baker, Fla., McTear has been engaging international competition for two years. Some feel he is the greatest sprint prospect in history.

McTear, blessed with a great start, may have an edge over Williams and Quarrie at the shorter indoor distances. Look for him to get the lead, with Borzov right there.

Williams and Quarrie will be on the move midway. Both possess great sprinting "lifts." Whether they can make up the ground on swifties like McTear and Borzov is the big question.

One thing for sure, these are four of the men who figure to be scuffling at the starting line this summer at Montreal.

As meet chairman Al Franken says: the only world class sprinter missing from tonight's Sunkist field is Silvio Leonard of Cuba.

Silvio may be making a big mistake. Borzov, Williams, Quarrie and McTear are getting a head start on him.

## Backwards in Form Only

Dwight Stones comes to jump. He also comes to talk. The combination has produced a lot of records and almost as much controversy.

After one meet, he was asked why he was wearing a shirt that was dotted with Walt Disney cartoon characters.

"Because it's a Mickey Mouse meet," he shot back.

He's feuded with coaches, with officials, with meet directors and with other athletes and at one stage in his career he got so sick of reading what he'd said, he started feuding with himself.

"I decided I better get a new act," he said. "I was turning into a miserable person."

But he didn't stop talking. Or jumping.

In last year's Sunkist meet, he had nothing to prove, having cleared 7-5 the night before in Pocatello to break Valeriy Brumel's indoor record of 7-4 5/8 which stood for 12 years. One world record a weekend should be enough for anybody.

Not Stones. On the final jump of the final event of the night at the Sports Arena, he cleared 7-5 1/4 to take the headlines away from Francie Larrieu who had set a women's record in the 1,000 meters and Dan Ripley who had set an amateur indoor record of 18-1 in the pole vault.

Stones didn't stop there. At the Times Indoor Games, he equaled the mark after the bar originally had been measured at a new record of 7-5 1/2. That started another feud but it didn't stop his ascension. Later in the indoor season, he raised the mark to 7-5 1/2, then to 7-5 3/4. Altogether, he broke Brumel's record five times.

In the outdoor season, he had five more clearances at 7-5 or better, giving him 10 for the year. Only two other men, Pacific Coast Club teammate Tom Woods and France's Paul Poaniewa, cleared 7-5 or better and they managed it only once.

So, at the age of 21, Stones had topped anything ever done in his event, having already claimed the world outdoor record of 7-6 1/2.

He's now 22, and there remains only one piece of unfinished business—an Olympic Games gold medal. In 1972 as a UCLA freshman, he won the bronze at Munich. The winner was a straddle jumper from Russia, Juri Tarmak. Stones, a Fosbury Flopper from the United States, is determined to turn it around.

If he does, the happiest people at Montreal will be those in the press box. Stones, they know, will have something to say.
