## How They Got To Detweiller

The top five placing teams and the top 5 individual runners not members of Qualifying teams in each Sectional advance to the State Final Meet in both Class A and Class AA competition. In addition, the first and second place teams

and the top five individual runners who are not members of the qualifying teams from the Chicago Public League Meet advance to the Class AA Meet.

# How to Watch and Score the State Final Meet

Cross country is not, by definition, a spectator sport. A typical high school course may be outlined by a baseball backstop, the school parking lot, the football field . . . and a playground swing set. There are picturesque courses, though the hills and woods, with narrow paths and tight turns. They often demand more of runners — and spectators who must sprint from one hilltop to the next to get an occasional glimpse of the runners.

The State Final Meet course here at Detweiller Park is neither an afterthought nor a hidden trail. It's necessary that it be open — most of the scenery, like the tree-covered hills to the west, is outside the course—because more than 200 runners must sort out themselves in the beginning of the Class AA race and, for instance, 42 runners finished within 12 seconds of each other when things were busiest in 1974.

An open course is a spectators' course. It is possible (with the help of binoculars) to see most of the race from any of several places. It's best to choose one spot and stay there since past meets have drawn more than 6,000 spectators. Spectators usually get in the way of other spectators, and sometimes the runners. **The basic rule for spectators is to stay on the road and off the course.** Prime viewing areas include:

**A Along the west side of the course,** from the point where the runners turn south the first time to the finish line. From here it's possible to see the start, the runners as they go past the half-mile and two-mile marks and the finish. The runners will pass the mile mark directly across the way.

**B From the back of the starting line,** and outside the path the runners will take. The perspective on the start is different from here. The runners circle the south end of the course two times and are coming at the spectator here for the finish, although it may be impossible to see them until they reach the finish chute.

**C From the triangle, north of the trees.** The runners get here through an opening in the trees, but spectators must stay on the road. Often the race for both individuals and teams is determined here. Elmhurst York's runners traditionally "check out" — try to pass five runners each — in here. While in the triangle, Lincoln-Way's Dave Walters broke contact with the field in the 1973 race and went on to a relatively easy victory. It is difficult to get to and from the triangle after watching the start and still see the finish, but there are fewer spectators in this area and the spectator will have a better look at, and a better feeling for, the runners in what is one of the psychologically toughest parts of the race.

There will be people on the infield once the runners have gone the first 440 yards. Don't be tempted to join them. The area is restricted to those with special badges. "The meet is for the runners," says Peoria Central Cross Country Coach Bob LaCroix. "We don't want to impede them in any way." In past years, spectators have been permitted onto the course when the race ended, but this morning Class AA runners will be preparing for their race as soon as the Class A competition is over, so spectators will have to be kept off the course then too.

For the first finishers, the three-mile race lasts a little over 14 minutes. The team winner may be determined by runners who take another minute to finish. There is an awful lot to keep track of in a relatively short amount of time.

**TEAM SCORING** — This is not a relay race. The team with the lowest total time for five runners does not necessarily win. The team score is the sum of the first five places earned by team members in competition

## Formula for Victory

Course conditions have varied and the race seems to become more competitive every year, but the basic formula for a championship has remained the same.

with other team runners. A simple example: a team that finishes 1-2-3-4-100 will score 110 and lose to a team that places 18-19-20-21-22 for a total of 100. The team champion is the one with the lowest score. To keep track of the team races first disregard all runners wearing numbers in the 300s. These are individuals who advanced, even though their teams didn't, from sectional competition. A team runner who finished 58th will count just 33 toward the team total if 25 unattached runners place ahead of him. How much lower a runner's team place is than his actual finish depends on the quality of the unattached field (in 1973, 12 of the first 16 and 23 of the first 38 runners to finish weren't involved in the team race).

Don't worry about the team score until the race is half completed. A team that sprints the first 440 yards downhill to the first turn may find its runners considerably less quick the third time they turn south. There are subtle dips, if not hills, if the course, which is 30 feet lower at the north end than at the south. The only important things at the 880-yard mark are that individual first-place hopefuls maintain contact with the lead and that teams are together and moving up. Every year some individuals, and even whole teams, that might have done well are left behind when they get caught at the first turn and literally have to stop and walk.

**PACKING**—Is a cross country team like a golf team, where each individual goes out to do his best and the results are an individually achieved totals? Not at all. Thornton's Wildcats running in a "pack" conjures up dangerous visions, but it is merely sound application of the theory used, in part at least, by every successful cross country team in the state. This is a race of the mind as well as of the body. It's nice to have an ally in the second mile, when the excitement of the start has worn off and thoughts of pushing hard the final mile can be oppressive. Team success becomes a more real goal when a runner can see his teammates passing runners, or they may even go past one simultaneously. It's not unusual to hear one teammate yelling, "Let's go get the next one" to another. Pack-racing is not perfect for every team, and don't expect the packs to stay together all the way into the chute. The runners may split up and go on their own for a mile and a half or two miles into the race after using the pack to get themselves out at a sensible pace. A team with six or seven good enough runners will have reinforcements near the front on a day when one of the top five isn't running well. The pack helps runners with less ability get the most out of themselves, but sometimes means a more talented runner must hang back. A team with athletes of disparate abilities may do better than those runners that go it alone, or in "packs" of two or three.

**THE WINNERS**—Chicago Heights (Bloom) won the state championship in 1975 when Larry Griffin, a senior out for cross country for the first time, knocked nearly a minute off his previous heat three-mile time to finish 104th overall and count 66 points toward his teams total of 128. York was second with 132 points. Griffin's accomplishment was so astonishing there were charges — charges which were proved untrue — that he had not run the entire course. "He was dead with a mile to go," said Bloom coach Don Slota. "It was just guts and desire. He wanted to be a state champion and now he is." How is a spectator to know to watch for such runners — to tell which runners who go out fast for one mile will still be near the front at three? It can't be done. In 1974 and 1975, the race for the individual title was decided by a sprint in the last quarter-mile. But what happens in the last 440 yards is determined in large measure by the 4,840 yards that go before that. And before that, the pre-race preparation. And the regular season before that. And the miles run over the summer before that. And . . . the teams and the individuals to watch are listed elsewhere. Just think in terms of uniforms, five of them. Keeping track of those runners will more than occupy the time.

# Who Will Become THE Small School in '77?

It may have been an overstatement. "It was THE small school in Illinois," said Dave Fry, an Illinois High School Association assistant executive secretary, last year before presenting Lebanon the first place trophy in the Class A cross country finals.

It's hard to underestimate the effect Lebanon-product Craig Virgin had on cross country in Illinois, but the sport was firmly established before Virgin and has flourished since he graduated from high school in 1973.

Still, it seemed appropriate last November when Lebanon—which has qualified for four of the last five one-class meets and finished a solid fifth in the 1975 finals—won the first Class A championship. The Greyhounds were so strong that even when ailing No. 1 runner Harvey Thomas faded into a non-scoring position, they won by 43 points.

But enough Lebanon—teams from schools like Elmwood, Beecher and Aurora (Marmion) must feel—is enough. "It's easier to be No. 1 than stay No. 1," said Lebanon Coach Ira Price. Lebanon was ranked No. 2 most of the season in a poll of coaches conducted by Timely Times, the state cross country newsletter.

**"I think maybe they might have done us a favor," Price said. "I think if everybody does their best we might surprise some people . . . But that's what it will take, our first five running their best."**

Lebanon scored 45 points to easily win its own sectional as Vic Burns and Terry Grunden finished three-four. Burns and Jeff Lee will be running in the state finals for the fourth time and Grunden, a junior, for the third.

"They really do feel they have something to prove," said Price. "We're going to run to win, not to keep from losing."

Rushville was second in the team race at Lebanon, scoring 105 points. Individually, Mark Capelle of Highland (St. Paul) pulled away from Rushville's Dick Tucker in the final mile. Capelle was fourth in last year's state meet, while Tucker—then a sophomore competing for Greenfield—was 13th.

In other sectionals last Saturday:

**AT PUTNAM COUNTY**—Daryl Dorich and Dan Harlan finished two-three to lead Elmwood to a 67-72 victory over Beecher, which had been ranked No. 1 in Class A by the coaches. Rod Andrews added a ninth-place finish for third-rated Elmwood.

Elmwood was seventh in last year's finals, but like most of the other teams involved, were running in a meet with so many good runners and so much

pressure for the first time.

**"The experience helps a lot," No. 1 runner Dorich said. "Everybody gets nervous, but there's nervous and there's scared. I don't think we'll be as scared as last year."**

Beecher was 14th last year and Tom Stulka, who won last week at Granville (Putnam County), finished 27th. "I really thought he had a chance to do well," Beecher Coach Steve Currins said, "but he went down there and he was scared to death."

That first trip to the state finals was the difference for Beecher's runners. "They get down there and they see what they can do . . ." said Currins. "We started working at it last January.

"Now we are beating teams they never would have envisioned they could beat," said Currins. There's one problem for Beecher—the other Class A teams have improved as well. "I didn't think it would take times this good," Currins said, verbally shaking his head.

Taylor Ridge (Rockridge) was third at Putnam County, then six teams finished within 48 points of each other. Manteno and Hoopston-East Lynn won the race for the fourth and fifth spots and trip to the state finals.

**AT MAPLE PARK (KANELAND)**—Aurora (Marmion) won a tight team race, scoring 96 points, just 20 more than fifth-place Woodstock (Marian). Peter Lortie of Chicago (Univ.), who was 16th last year, won the individual race. Tom Clennon of Minooka, who was third a year ago, ran despite a high fever and finished third.

Clennon won the Class A mile and two-mile titles last spring, but won't be able to defend them. Minooka, which had 741 students last year, has 760 this fall, pushing it past the 750 enrollment figure which divides Class A and Class AA. Minooka is running in the Class A finals today because fall sports are classified on last year's enrollment.

Clennon and two of the other runners who figure toward the front today are quite familiar with each other. Clennon, St. Paul's Capelle and Don Weber of Robinson were one-two-three in the two-mile last May, then finished one-two-four in the mile.

**AT FLORA**—Fifth man Lee Schuette clinched the title for Effingham (St. Anthony) when he finished 30th. St. Anthony scored 81 points to 89 for Blue Mound and 99 by Fairfield. "It was a super race, I'll tell you," Flora Coach Dave Dulaney said.

Metropolis sophomore Gary Bremer made the individual race less interesting. He pulled away from Robinson's Weber and Gary Jackson of Blue Mound by the two-mile mark and coasted to victory in 15:02, a good time on the Flora course. Last year Weber, who ran 15:18 this time, ran 15:31 and won the race by 11 seconds.

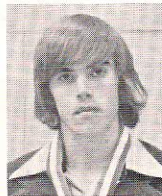

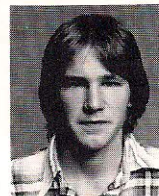

# Graves Can Become 5th Two-Time Winner

After last year's Class AA cross country awards had been handed out in Peoria Central's gymnasium, Tom Graves allowed himself to think briefly of the next year. Would he like to break Craig Virgin's course record, he was asked.

"For sure," Graves said, smiling. He had just run a quick 14:08.5 for three miles despite chilling weather, and it will take some improvement today and better weather if he is to challenge the 13:50.6 Virgin ran in 1972. "It will take a lot more work . . . particularly on the middle mile," said Graves. "And the last mile has got to be quicker, a lot quicker."

Graves must be worried about more than the record today. He hasn't lost a race this fall, but neither have Jim Spivey of Bensenville (Fenton) or Tom Wuchte of DeKalb. Spivey was second to Graves last year. Wuchte was fifth last November and unable to run in track because of an injury.

**If Graves, who was third as a sophomore, wins today he will become the fifth two-time winner. The others were Virgin in 1971-72, Dave Merrick of New Lenox (Lincoln-Way) in 1969-70, Charles Schulz of Evanston in 1962-63 and Weymouth Kirkland of Winnetka (New Trier) in 1959-60.**

"I can almost see it," Wuchte said, writing a possible script for today's race. "I think things will open up around the middle of the back loop."

"If anybody is with Graves at two miles, you can't predict what will happen because no one has stayed with him that long."

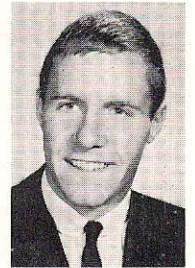
Graves won last week's sectional at Lincoln-Way by 26 seconds, Spivey won by 27 seconds at Oak Park although he failed to set a course record for the first time in five races and Wuchte broke the Princeton course record and won by 12 seconds. The old Princeton record was set in 1975 by Dan Gilchrist of Rockford (East). The next week Gilchrist finished second in the state finals.

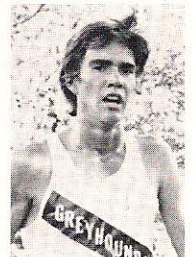

## Is Deerfield Team The Best Ever?

Just how good is the Deerfield High School cross country team? The best in Illinois high school history? Year-to-year improvement often means the latest champion is the best ever. The best in the country? Deerfield was ranked No. 1 at the end of last season by The Harrier and again before this season began. Unbeatable in today's Class AA finals? The last question doesn't have to be answered by comparisons or arguments, but at three miles today through Detweiller Park. And there are several coaches who know exactly how their teams might beat Deerfield.

"They are absolutely awesome," DeKalb Coach John Byrnett said after Deerfield finished 2-3-4-5-7 and scored 22 points in the Crystal Lake Invitational the first weekend of the season. "They are like a college team," Proviso West coach Larry Wiczorek said after Deerfield scored 21 points to win the Proviso West Invitational the next week.

So it went through the season. Deerfield scored just 30 points to win the sectional at Crystal Lake.

**"I have to accept it, the team has to accept it," Deerfield coach Len Kisellus said early in**

**the year. "We're the best team going in. Just so something doesn't happen and we blow the whole thing."**

South Eugene, Ore., was ranked second nationally last year. "It's really hard to see how far 'behind' they were," noted Marc Bloom, editor and publisher of The Harrier, a national cross country magazine. "It was pretty close, if I recall my analysis accurately."

"Historically speaking, it is virtually impossible to compare distance runners from different areas because there are so many changing variables," Bloom noted. "If Deerfield continued to roll through an unbeaten season and again is rated No. 1, I would guess that there would be very few teams in the history of organized cross country that could be held with higher esteem."

Deerfield returns its top three runners (Keith Hampton and twins Todd and Mark McAllister), four of its top five and five from the seven-man state meet team which pretty much had its own way last November. The Warriors scored 111 points to 142 by runnerup Wheaton (North) in what was probably the best team performance since the distance of the race was increased to three miles in 1971.

Not even times are a completely just way of comparing teams, because weather conditions are

different every year, the course may vary a bit in length and a runner who ran 14:42 in 1973 surely would not have finished in a dead heat with one who ran 14:42 in 1976. Forgetting such imperfections, were the first and second place teams from each of the past five meets tossed into one 10-team meet, Deerfield would win with 95½ points to 98 by York's 1973 state champions. York's 1974 runnerups would finish next with 103 points, eight points ahead of the 1974 Bloom team which won the title (a result which points out one problem with this mythical meet).

Other results: 5. Riverside-Brookfield (1973) 115, 6. Wheaton North (1976) 120½, 7. York (1972) 124½, 8. Bloom (1975) 136½, 9. York (1975) 146, 10. Arlington Heights Hersey (1972) 225.

**But what about teams before 1972? York scored 61 points in 1962 and 1965, Proviso West scored 46 in 1964, and before 1953 only one of seven state champions scored more than 49 points. Urbana managed the lowest score ever, 21 points in 1951. There were just 10 district champions in the finals in 1951, compared to 27 today, meaning there were fewer running to drive the scores up.**

Charles Metheny of Paris won the two-mile race in 10:22.4 that year, and more than 100 runners—maybe 150—will go *through* two miles that fast today and still have a mile to run.

So maybe that Urbana team wouldn't be able to keep up with Deerfield—or even Palatine (Fremd) or Elmhurst (York) or Lebanon. But Gene Armer, who coached that team and 27 others before retiring at Urbana, is not ready to make such a concession.

"It's like saying you think that Jack Dempsey is better than Muhammad Ali," he said. "I don't know. It's hard to compare. You know they (the 1951 team) were pretty good runners, when three of them went on to run at the University of Illinois.

"I don't know if they could compete today . . ." Armer said, his voice trailing off, then changing gears when he realized how that sounded. "Oh, I'm sure they could compete, but I don't know if the decision would be as unanimous as it was then."

Urbana wasn't even the favorite going into the 1951 finals. Danville had scored 51 points to Urbana's 54 in the Big 12 conference meet, and LaGrange—coached by Gene Armer's brother Max—was supposed to be the team to chase in the finals.

**I didn't really believe two days before that we could win it," said Vern Scheuring, Urbana's No. 1 runner. "We'd heard all those terrifying things about LaGrange . . . But Gene kept telling us we could do it."**

"We just had a bunch of skinny-legged kids," said Armer. "I don't know if I could point to any difference between that team and others except the quality of the boys on the team . . . Our kids were probably more dedicated than most others."

In 1951, when the mile was a long distance race and the four-minute mile an unreachd barrier, at many schools cross country was a sport for basketball players in training and half-milers waiting for track season. Not at Urbana, a school with less than 600 students at the time.

Armer gave out awards for miles run during the summer. "I worked the kids pretty hard," he said. "But we never worked out twice a day," said Scheuring. "We didn't work as hard as kids do now."

The weather turned bitterly cold the week before the 1951 state meet. "Gene made us run outside all week long," said Scheuring. "I think the Chicago area teams practiced inside—they weren't ready for the weather."

**The temperature was 18 degrees at race time Nov. 3, 1951, and the wind came in gusts of up to 30 miles per hour out of the southwest—straight at the runners for the first mile on the University of Illinois Golf Course at Savoy. "It was cold. I mean it was cold," said Scheuring. "The runners from Chicago (Englewood) refused to get out of their bus and run."**

Scheuring finished second, 20 yards behind Metheny, and counted one point since Paris didn't qualify a team for the finals. John Mock, who had finished 10th in the district the week before, was fourth—which counted as second. Tom Luker was sixth (third once the unattached runners were removed from the scoring), Leonard Wilson 12th (seventh) and John Hedgecock 16th (eighth).

"Gene was always trying to get us to finish within 30 seconds of each other," said Scheuring. "I don't know if we did it that day nor not." LaGrange was second with 61 points and Peoria (Woodruff) third with 72—both low point totals by today's standards, but not close to Urbana.

How should Deerfield's effort today be compared to Urbana's 26 years ago? Perhaps it would be better to wait until after the race.

And now, here's how today's Class AA finalists got here:

**AT CRYSTAL LAKE**—Running against two of the state's other top five teams, Deerfield placed six runners in the top 15 and scored 30 points. Palatine had 71 points and Palatine (Fremd) 73. Tom Johnson of Palatine, who was 13th last year, won the race. Todd and Mark McCallister of Deerfield took the next two spots.

Mark was third even though he was spiked in the first half-mile of the race. He had 12 stitches after the race, but will run today. Keith Hampton—who hadn't run competitively in a month returned to finish seventh. Hampton was also injured in the weeks before last year's finals, but finished 15th.

**AT OAK PARK**—Elmhurst (York), which has lost to a total of four teams in the last six state finals, packed five runners in the first 12 and scored 35 points to 69 by runnerup Chicago (Gordon Tech).

"You take Deerfield out and there are eight or nine teams that can win it," York coach Joe Newton said.

York's fifth man was 30 seconds behind its first last week, and there was just a 12-second gap from two to five. York is as solid a barometer to the quality of the state meet field as any. This year's team would likely be the favorite in the 1971 or 1972 state finals.

"These guys I got are good. They don't have to take a back seat to anybody," said Newton, "but the

depth when you go down there is tougher every year."

**AT LINCOLN-WAY**—Glen Ellyn (Glenbard West) had little trouble winning the team title, scoring 78 points to 112 by Orland Park (Sandburg). Glenbard West returns four of its top five runners from last year's team—which finished ninth in the finals—and has beaten York in an invitational, a dual meet and the West Suburban Conference Meet. The last team to beat York in the conference meet was Park Ridge (Maine East) in 1970. Maine East went on to win the state title.

**AT PRINCETON**—Peoria (Richwoods) won a tight team race. There were only eight points separating Richwoods and fourth-place Belvidere. Four teams ranked among the state's top 25 during the season by the cross country newsletter Timely Times board of coaches failed to advance from this highly competitive sectional.

"When the winning team's scores is up over 100," said Princeton Coach Gary Coates, "you know they were running hard."

The fifth team to qualify was Rockford (East),

which had just one letter winner when the season began. The Rockford public schools were without any sports last year, and a one-year hiatus can set a cross country program back years. But East coach Chuck Wallin kept his runners competing in open AAU meets in the fall, then again during the track season. Now East, which was fifth in the 1975 finals and which would have been a contender last year, has picked up where it left off.

**AT SPRINGFIELD**—Host Springfield (Lanphier) won the team title and Bob Weilmuenster of Belleville (East) broke the course record to win by 10 seconds. Lanphier—which lost three members of its top seven when the Zarndt family moved away just before the season began—scored 82 points to 109 by Belleville (East).

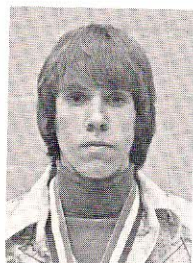
