MARY DECKER SLANEY: Official 1986 Kinney Cross Country Championships Spokesperson. Mary's role as our spokesperson is to share her experience and expertise with the Kinney finalists. She walked the Balboa Park course with the finalists on Friday and was the featured speaker at Friday night's banquet. This great star of the track and field world spent the entire Kinney Cross Country Championships weekend in San Diego and is available to our young runners.

TIM HACKER: 1986 Alumnus of the Year. Tim is the first recipient of our Alumnus of the Year award. Many Kinney Cross Country Championships participants have gone on to become stars at the collegiate and international level. A fourth place finisher in the 1980 finals after having won the Midwest Regional, Tim enjoyed a standout career at the University of Wisconsin. He led the Badgers to two NCAA cross country titles and, in 1985, won the NCAA individual cross country championship.

GEORGE ALLEN: Keynote Speaker. National Football League legend George Allen will deliver the keynote speech to the athletes at the award ceremony to follow today's race. Aside from compiling one of the outstanding coaching records in NFL history during his tenure with the Los Angeles Rams and Washington Redskins, Allen is the chairman of the National Fitness Foundation and an advisor to the President's Council on Physical Fitness.

MARTY LIQUORI: Host of "Running and Racing" on ESPN. An all time great in the annals of track and one of only three high schoolers ever to run a sub-four minute mile. 
# **CROSS COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIPS**

## **Unveiling Tomorrow's Stars Today**

The Kinney Cross Country Championships are billed as the only truly national championships in all of high-school sports. While the notion of a national championship in football or basketball is a pipe dream at best, the meet's organizers are sure it is a reality in the sport of cross country.

The competition is open to any grade 9 through 12 athlete who com-

petes in cross country during the high school season. With four regional races held throughout the country (New York, NY; Charlotte, NC; Kenosha, WI; Fresno, CA), eight boys and eight girls emerge from each as national finalists. Those 64 prep runners are brought to San Diego to compete in the national finals where the national champions are determined.



Now in its eighth year of existence, "The Kinney" has enjoyed unprecedented growth. It has progressed from a "good idea" to a "good meet" to a totally unique event which has become the yardstick by which to evaluate a distance runner.

"The first year we were struggling to gain credibility," says the meet's national coordinator, Max Mayo. "No one knew what we were. We had a national championship, but everone said 'maybe you do have a national championship, maybe you don't.' We gained credibility with the knowledgeable track and field people as each year passed. In the past few years, the experts agree that everyone who had a shot at qualifying did indeed compete. Now, it's taken for granted that year in and year out, the Kinney Cross Country Championships will produce the true national champions."

In the 1979 debut of the event, only 27 states were represented with just a handful of state champions. In recent years, runners from all 50 states have competed. In fact, the Kinney Cross Country Championships seem

to have spurred the growth of the sport itself. Cross country is now one of the most popular sports for high school athletes.


The Kinney has also provided colleges with a great forum to evaluate talent which has helped build college programs and increase scholarship opportunities.


There are so many benefits to this meet," says Mayo. "Sure it gives kids a great chance to impress the college recruiters. They scout us at the national and regional level. A lot of the kids who don't make the finals still get scholarships. But it also gives many athletes a great chance to compete at a highly competitive level. For most of our runners, the regional meet is the most competitive race they will ever run. That in itself is a great experience."

At the national finals, the regional finalists take part in what is usually their first taste of the big time. All 64 athletes are flown to San Diego at the expense of the sponsors and treated to a weekend at the famous Hotel del Coronado. The rivals do everything together from morning workouts to banquets featuring top athletes who share their own experiences. Sebastian Coe, Steve Scott, Francie Larrieu Smith and Marty Liquori have all been official Kinney spokespersons.

#### Playing the Recruiting Game

The camaraderie these young athletes develop is not hard to explain. Although they come from diverse areas and background, they have much in common. They are joined by the common thread that





moves them toward the next step in their athletic and educational career: choosing the right college. For the elite of cross country, like any other sport, certain pressures must be dealt with. These are distractions that can affect performance drastically, both on the cross country trails and in the classroom.

Janet Smith became well acquainted with the pressures during a recordsmashing senior year which culminated in winnng the 1983 Kinney Cross Country Championships. The Edison, New Jersey native was recruited by dozens of big time colleges and could probably have chosen any school she desired. The distractions of recruiting became part of her daily routine.

"I'd narrow my choices down a little quicker if I had it to do over again," says Janet, now a junior at North Carolina State. "It's better to focus on a half dozen schools and learn a lot about each, as opposed to knowing a little bit about every school."

Janet has little cause to regret her decision. She has captured an Atlantic Coast Conference Cross Country Championship and finished second in her first two seasons on the college level. "When selecting a school, it's important to meet the coach and feel comfortable with him." she stressed. "It's also good to speak with the team members and see how they get along with him. You can really get a feeling for the program that way."

After her victory at Kinney, Janet noticed the recruiting intensified to a high level. She offers this advice for any athlete facing that kind of pressure. "Be honest! If you're not interested in a school, tell the coach. He may not want to hear 'no', but you have to be firm."

Connie Jo Robinson, a senior teammate of Janet's at North Carolina State, was a Kinney champ in 1981. She remembers the recruiting process in a positive light and stresses that it can be a good experience. "It was a great chance to get to know people," according to the Cincinnati runner. "You learn to make comparisons between one coach and the next and to make important decisions in a mature manner. Overall, it was fun."


Brian Jaeger, twice a finalist on the boy's side, used the meet as a springboard to a college career at Auburn University. He also notes the importance of getting to know the coach you'll be working with. "Don't be afraid to speak to the coach and ask questions. He is going to be working with you for the next four years, so it is important to feel at ease with him."

While Janet, Connie Jo and Brian all were aided by their Kinney success, it's true they were heavily recruited even before their prestigious performances. That was not the case with Matt Giusto.


"Winning the 1983 Kinney Championships was the turning point, the race that launched my career," says the University of Arizona junior. "Once you prove yourself at Kinney, you can virtually name the college of your choice."

Before the Kinney Championships, Matt was regarded as a college prospect with a fair reputation but was not envisioned as a superstar. It was not until the meet that the coaches realized Matt was being under-recruited.

"The Kinney Championships give coaches a chance to connect a name to a face and body," says University of Oregon coach Tom Heinonen. "You read about athletes, but to actually see them perform in this type of meet is very helpful in evaluating potential."

Heinonen points out that it is not always the winners who leave the best impression. "The difference between fifth and fifteenth place is quite minimal," he says. "In some cases the lower finishers have more room to improve and will do so during their college careers. As a coach that's why I like to see them in person."

#### Is College for Everyone?

Some runners are not cut out for college at all. Cathy Schiro, the 1984 Kinney Champ, still holds the course record. That accomplishment coupled with her stunning ninth-place finish in the Olympic Trials Marathon led everyone to believe she would be a great collegiate athlete. In fact, she lasted less than one semester at the University of Oregon before deciding college competition was not for her.

"The U.S. system almost requires every good athlete to accept a college scholarship," says Heinonen, Schiro's coach during her college career. "But not everyone is cut out to go to college at age 18. Cathy Schiro was so good she had another alternative." Heinonen referred to Schiro's decision to continue competing at the amateur level with the support of a major running shoe sponsor.

Schiro's record could be in jeopardy this year as Erin Keogh of McLean, Virginia attempts to become the first ever two-time winner of the event.

#### **Words of Wisdom**

Ceci Hopp (Cos Cob, CT) was the winner of the 1980 Kinney Race and finished a career that saw both highs and lows. "I went into college thinking I had to do it all," says Ceci warning of one of the dangers of success and the recruiting pressure. "I probably over-trained."


While she did win an NCAA championship in track and several All American Awards, she is quick to point out that a well-balanced college experience can not be over emphasized. "It is really important to have secondary options after sports. You need to have something to fall back on," she says.

Connie Jo Robinson agrees. "Use your teammates and coaches for support," she says. "But don't just talk about running. They can make you feel like you belong and that's the most important thing."

1986 is sure to produce a new crop of cross country stars who will become the stars and Olympians of tomorrow. The Kinney Cross Country Championships will definitely play a role in who these stars will be. The championships and finalists are certain to catch the eyes of collegiate recruiters and will have to learn to handle the pressures. Other runners will use the regional races to improve their skills for next year's competition or for their upcoming college careers. Stills other will be running their one big race before leaving the sport upon graduation.

One thing is for certain. Whether you're a cross country runner, a high school coach or a college coach, the Kinney Cross Country Championships mean one thing...the national championships of high school cross country.



#### OUR 1986 SPOKESPERSON, MARY DECKER SLANEY

One of the brightest stars in the world of track and field, Mary Decker Slaney is regarded as the greatest middle distance runner in the history of women's track.

The world record holder in the mile and 2,000 meters, she holds American records at every distance between 800 meters and 10,000 meters.

Her litany of awards includes being named Sportswoman of the Year by Sports Illustrated and Athlete of the Year by Track and Field News. Just 28 years old, she has been a prominent figure in international track for more than a decade.

The defending world champion in both the 3,000 and 1,500 meters, she's back in training for the '87 world championships after giving birth to her first child, Ashley, on May 30.
