M-S runners eye repeat at Chrisman

"Our boys team could be stronger than last year's, which placed 10th in the state in Class A," said Mahomet-Seymour's prep cross country coach John King. "Our girls team should be fairly strong, too."

Both teams certainly figure to be prime contenders for top honors in Chrisman's annual Invitational, slated to draw a score of teams to the

competition beginning at 9 am Saturday.

King's boy Bulldogs, in fact, are favored to win; they've lost only two runners from the lineup which ran away with the title last year. They registered the remarkable score of 17 in

'87. Chrisman was runnerup with 36.

King's girls settled for fifth at Chrisman last September, outpointed by Urbana Uni High, Unity, Chrisman and Robinson, in that order.

M-S boys who scored impressively last year were Jeff Jankowski and Dave Seifert, now seniors; Brian Easter and Hans Waters, now juniors; and Danny Nielsen, Jason Lasater and Burt Huddleston, now sophomores.

Laura Batsie, now a senior, was most noteworthy of Mahomet-Seymour's girls contingent in '87; she ran second at Chrisman with a two-mile time

of 13:05. Senior Jacqui Harland, juniors Barbara King and Sarah Brucker, and sophomore Mindy Carpenter also are back. Junior Tara Treat is a transfer from St. Joseph-Ogden.

King and his teams were approaching the Chrisman meet as though it were the first of the season. But a phone call received Monday changed all that; Champaign Centennial, Bloomington and Decatur Eisenhower reminded King that they would be in Mahomet for a meet Tuesday.

"I don't know exactly what threw us off our schedule," said King, "but we had to hustle to get ready to host the meet."

Bulldogs run third, fourth at Chrisman

Chrisman's Cardinals claimed both boys and girls titles in their annual Prep Invitational Cross Country Meet last Saturday, but Mahomet-Seymour recorded worthy runnerup finishes—a strong third among 28 boys teams and fourth among eight girls squads.

Chrisman's boys won with a score of 16. Shelbyville was second with 19, Mahomet-Seymour (champion last year with 17) was third with 21.

Chrisman's girls were first with a count of 53. Unity was second with 60, Urbana Uni High third with 73 and Mahomet-Seymour fourth with 110

M-S boys finished as follows in slot competition: (1) Danny Nielsen second in 15:25 (3-mile course); (2) Hans Waters fourth in 16:35; (3) Jay Busey fourth in 16:42; (4) Jeff Jankowski second in 16:50; (5) Brian Easter third in 16:54; (6) Burt Huddleston second in 16:47; (7) Derek Short

fourth in 17:11. Jason Lasater won the Open Boys class in 17:14.

M-S girls, vying in a two-mile Open Run, were paced by Laura Batsie, who placed sixth with a time of 12:49 (last year she ran second in 13:05). Her teammates followed in this order: Jacqui Harland 21st in 13:45; Barbara King 25th in 14:18; Tara Treat 35th in 14:48; Jill Yost 42nd in 15:40; Mindy Carpenter 63rd in 17:25; Sarah Brucker 70th in 18:17.

Coach King's Bulldogs had opened their 1988 schedule August 30 with the boys running second to Bloomington, 67 to 21, and the girls finishing

fourth to Decatur Eisenbower, Bloomington, and Champaign Centennial, 84 to 31, 53 and 80 respectively, in a quadrangular.

Nielsen was third over the 3.1-mile M-S course in 17:27, and Waters was ninth in 18:13 for the boys. Batsie was second over the 2.1-mile course in 13:26 for the girls.

Mahomet-Seymour will host Olympia and Bloomington Central Catholic Thursday afternoon, then bid in Paxton's annual Invitational Saturday, starting at 9 am. Last year the boy Bulldogs placed sixth among 23 entires, while the girls ran fourth in a nine-school field.

Mahomet-Seymour's prep boys and girls cross country runners placed third and fourth respectively in Paxton's Invitational last Saturday.

The Bulldog boys, with a score of 103, ran third to Chrisman, first with 45 and Kankakee Bishop McNamara, third with 70.

Individually, Danny Nielsen placed third in the 3-mile boys race with a time of 16:09, and Laura Batsie was fourth in the 2mile girls race with a time of 12:27.

Last Thursday, Mahomet-Seymour defeated Uni High and Olympia, 26 to 52 to 54 in the boys run, while the girls ran third to Uni and Olympia, 51 to 29 to 41 respectively.

Nielsen showed the way over the Lake of the Woods' 3.1-mile course with a clocking of 17:31. Jeff Jankowski was fourth in 18:23, Jay Busey sixth in 18:44, Hans Waters seventh in 18:46, Burt Huddleston eighth in 18:52 and Brian Easter 10th in 19:00.

Mount Pulaski on volleyball roll

That Mount Pulaski High School has started the volleyball season with eight straight wins is no shock to Coach Donna Dulle.

"The last three years it's gone that way," she said.

Dulle will be surprised, though, if good things don't continue to happen.

"This is a different kind of season. We're real intense and want it real bad," she said. "We've worked harder in practice than we ever have in the past."

The past has not been so bad for the Toppers ranked seventh in the first Associated Press Class A poll released yesterday. They've gone to the supersectional twice and were beaten in the sectional championship last year.

Leading the way is junior Tina Rogers. The strong 6-foot-2 middle hitter is joined in the front row by Stacy Letterle, who is Mount Pulaski's only senior.

Junior Denise Donnelly and sophomore Jennifer Murphy are the setters. Laurie Letterle, Stacy's sophomore sister, is one starter at outside hitter. The other starter has come from junior Sara Schroth, and sophomores Kelly Davis and Tara Fisher.

Mount Pulaski finds out how good it really is at the Manteno Tournament Saturday. The host team and Hume Shiloh will provide some stiff competition.

Is finally reaching the state tournament a realistic goal?

"Oh, yeah," said Dulle.

Mahomet-Seymour off and running

After a summer of nice and easy training, Mahomet-Seymour's cross country team looks as if it is rounding into shape.

The Bulldogs took first place in last Saturday's Tuscola Classic, edging Shelbyville by two points. Mahomet-Seymour finished third the previous two weeks in meets at Chrisman and Paxton.

Coach John King, whose team placed a disappointing 10th in last year's Class A State Meet, does not believe in strenuous summer training.

"They made it more fun instead of working real

hard," he said. 'I don't believe in pushing them (in the summer) unless they want to. (Dan) Nielsen ran as much as aryone, but he did not kill himself."

Nielsen, a sophomore, led the Bulldog pack with a third-place finish at Tuscola. Mahomet-Seymour's top five runners — including senior Jay Busey, juniors Brian Easter and Hans Waters, and sophomore Burt Huddleston — were in the top 17.

The other two runners in the Bulldogs' top seven are senior Jeff Jankowski and sophomore Jason

King expects Mahomet-Seymour to better its state finish of a year ago. The Bulldogs will know where they stand when they travel to the Amboy Invitational on Oct. 10 to compete with most of the state's best teams.



Tremont moved from eighth to sixth and U High leap-frogged from 12th to seventh. Mahometseymour maintained its No. 4 position and Chrisman remained the top team. Also receiving votes were Delavan and Mason City.

In Class AA, Bloomington joined the list of teams receiving votes while Schaumburg continued atop the poll.

Runners repeat 3rd, 4th places

While Chrisman doubled its dominance of St. Joseph-Ogden's Spartan Classic, Mahomet-Seymour marked time in its bid for honors in the prestigious cross country meet last Saturday.

Chrisman, now rated tops in both boys and girls Class A competition in the state, finished first in both categories at St. Joseph. The girls were repeat champions.

For the second year in a row, Mahomet-Seymour's boys ran third (136 points to Chrisman's winning 36) and its girls ran fourth (110 to Chrisman's 28).

Individually, Bulldog Danny Nielsen placed fourth with a time of 15:36 for the 3-mile course, and teammate Brian Easter finished 19th in 16:06. Laura Batsie placed 13th in the girls' 2-mile race with a time of 12:39. Barbara King was 20th in

12:49, and Jacqui Harland 24th in 13:00

Earlier in the week, the M-S boys topped a five-team field and the M-S girls won a three-team competition at Decatur. Nielsen ran second over three miles in 16:29, Burt Huddleston was fifth in 17:04 and Jeff Jankowski ninth in 17:24. Batsie won the girls' 2-miler in 12:55, King was second in 13:19, Tara Treat sixth in 14:07 and Jill Yost ninth in 15:51.

Class A state rankings last weekend showed Mahomet-Seymour's boys fourth with 68 points. Chrisman was first with 125, Kaneland second with 112 and Princeton third with 109. M-S girls rated 12th with 29 points. Chrisman was first with 105, Seneca second with 69, Unity third with 63 and Urbana Uni High fourth with 51.

Second and fourth at Normal . . . third and fourth at Mahomet . . . and seventh and 10th at Amboy . . .

That's a capsule summary of how Mahomet-Seymour's boys and girls cross-country teams respectively fared in the Big Three prep meets which annually provide an early October warmup for imminent regional and sectional tests.

The Amboy meet, run off Monday, was as prestigious as ever. Mahomet-Seymour's boys placed seventh in a field of 33 schools, while its girls ran 10th in a field of 19.

Princeton won the boys competition with a score of 108. Tremont was a close second with 113 despite running two of its sophomores in a junior varsity division. Sparta placed third with 135, Chrisman fourth with 164. Mahomet-Seymour rated seventh with 247.

Pacing the M-S Bulldogs' effort was, as usual, sophomore Danny Nielsen; he finished 17th with a time of 15:48 for the 3-mile course. Supporting him were Jeff Jankowski, 28th in 16:03; Burt Huddleston, 48th in 16:27; Brian Easter, 56th in 16:37; Hans Waters, 98th in 17:08.

Scoring for the Bulldog girls were Laura Bassie, eighth over the 2 1/2-mile course in 15:16; Jacqui Harland, 21st in 16:00; Barbara King, 43rd in 17:01; Jill Yost, 63rd in 17:26; Mindy Carpenter, 128th in 19:57.

Mahomet-Seymour's Invitational staged last Saturday, was its 13th annual edition, and coach John King and staff again conducted it with model organization and efficiency.

Little Chrisman claimed both boys and girls team titles, the boys repeating their 1987 triumph. Chrisman's score of 52 was an easy first for the boys, Kankakee Bishop McNamara was second with 81, Mahomet-Seymour third with 125. Seventeen schools competed.

The Chrisman girls were tops with a score of 42. Unity was runnerup with 62, followed by Olympia with 109 and Mahomet-Seymour 153 in a field of 14.

M-S soph Nielsen placed second in the boys race, timed in 16:37. Jeremy Skinner of Shelbyville was the winner in 16:21. Other Mahomet-Seymour placers and times: Waters, 24th in 17:59 Jankowski, 28th in 18:08; Easter, 34th in 18:15; Huddleston, 39th in 18:19. One

hundred and 15 boys completed the event.

Ashley Wright of St. Joseph-Ogden finished first in the girls run, earning a time of 11:26 for the two miles. Batsie led the Mahomet-Seymour contingent, notching 17th place in 12:41. King was 22nd in 12:54, Harland 29th in 13:03; Tara Treat 47th in 13:44; Jill Yost, 49th in 13:47. Ninety-nine girls competed.

Chrisman also won the boys title in the Junior High meet which preceded Mahomet's varsity Invitational, scoring 58 vs. 73 for runnerup Columbia of Champaign. Chrisman's Junior High girls, moreover, placed second to Danville Northridge, 64 points to 47.

Mahomet-Seymour's Junior High boys finished fifth, while its girls placed third. Individually, Wagner of M-S ran third in a field of 82 boys, and Johnson of M-S was eighth among 71 girls.

The Bulldog preps have a date at Argenta, including Monticello, Thursday. Coach King, however, plans to rest his varsity to get them ready for the Corn Belt Conference meet at Pontiac, scheduled at 10 am Saturday.







Mahomet-Seymour placed 11th in the state's Class A high school boys cross country finals in cold, damp weather at Peoria's Detweiller Park last Saturday.

"I had been hoping we'd finish in the top 10," said coach John King, whose Bulldogs compiled a score of 273. "Actually, our showing came close to being a repeat of our performance of a year ago. We placed 10th with a score of 288 last year.

"The boys didn't run poorly, though most of their times were higher than the ones they had in the sectional meet at Paxton a week earlier. I guess you could blame the weather for that."

M-S sophomore Danny Nielsen, the Dawgs' season-long pace-setter, placed 22nd with a 3mile time of 15:55. He had run third in 15:25 in the Paxton sectional.

Senior Laura Batsie, the only Mahomet-Seymour girl to qualify for the newly established class A (small school) state finals, wound up 28th with a time of 13:19 for the girls' 2.1mile course. She had finished 20th with a time of 12:46 for Paxton's 2-mile sectional.

"Laura had reason to be pleased with her performance," said King.

Supporting Nielsen for Mahomet-Seymour in the boys division were: junior Brian Easter, 49th in 16:25; junior Hans Waters, 94th in 16:47; senior Jeff Jankowski, 96th in 16:48; soph Burt Huddleston, 120th in 17:06. Also-rans were senior Jay Busey, 125th in 17:09, and junior James Yost, 166th in 18:15. Freshman Derek Short attended as an alternate.

Disregarding non-team contestants, Nielsen placed 11th, Easter 32nd, Waters 68th, Jankowski 70th and Huddleston 92nd.

Little Chrisman, directed by famed basketball coach Roger Beals, was the sensation of the state finals. The Cardinals registered the unprecedented feat of winning both boys and girls state titles. Their Class A boys posted a score of 122, followed by Tremont with 139, and Maple Park Kaneland, last year's champion, with 140. Normal U-High was ninth with 240, Kankakee Bishop McNamara 10th with 266.

The top five among Class A girls were Chrisman with 74, Tolono Unity 103, Urbana Uni High 121, Chicago Luther North 146 and Winnebago 147. The first four had finished in the same order at Paxton's sectional.

Eric Detmer of Breese Mater Dei was the Class A boys winner with a time of 15:05. Chris Salisbury of Genoa-Kingston was the first girl across the line in 12:22.

"It was a pretty good year," summed up Coach King. "Next year? We have enough holdover talent to have pretty fair teams. Jankowski and Busey of the boys, and Batsie and Jacqui Harland of the girls are our only

Erickson, Tremont earn 2nds in state cross country meet

PEORIA - At this time last year, Eureka High School's John Erickson was - athletically speaking - a nobody.

Yesterday he was somebody big in the Class A state cross country meet at Detweiller Park.

In his first year in the sport and just the sixth cross country race of his career, Erickson placed second to Eric Detmer of Breese Mater Dei.

The Tremont team, running with just one senior, lived up to its No. 2 state ranking by placing second behind Chrisman, 122-139. The Turks had the state's best sophomore in Chad Gingrich (fifth) and the best freshman in Brad Kaufmann (29th).

In Class AA, Normal Community's Tim Bass placed 14th. No Ironmen has ever finished higher. His time was equal to the Class A champion's 15 minutes, 5 seconds for the 3mile course.

It was Detmer who kicked past Erickson for the state 3,200-meter track title last spring. Yesterday, he surged away after the mile mark. Erickson rallied, but finished 12 seconds back.

Detmer's 15:05 was the slowest winning time in the 13 years of Class A competition. A cold, wet wind was largely responsible.

'He just took off," said Erickson of Detmer once the lead pack of five entered the "triangle" portion of the course. "He's a

phenomenal runner. I haven't had the training and stuff he has. This race I ran how I should have."

Eureka track coach Ron Eeten agreed.

"Detmer is in better condition," Eeten said. "I think John realized that. Instead of trying to catch him, spending himself and then fading to 10th or something, he was smart enough to realize he should run for second."

Gingrich more than realized his goal of a top 10 finish. The sophomore ran 15:24 in fifth, the third non-senior to finish. Herscher junior John Eggenberger was third and Leland junior Phillip Swenson fourth.

"He finished higher than anyone from Tremont ever has," said Tremont coach Mike Lynn. "He ran a very controlled race. From a half mile to a mile and a half he moved up through the pack.

"That takes intelligence and discipline to do that. Most runners, if they can't see the leaders, they panic and get discouraged."

Gingrich guessed he passed 25 runners after a 5:00 first mile.

"I felt tired at two miles," said Gingrich, who is bullish on Tremont's chances next year. "We're gonna go all the way."
