## Boys cross country team advances to Saturday's state meet

Even though Coach King and all the Bulldog runners would love to win the State meet, a little realism says something else. "I would like to see our team finish in the top ten," com-

mented King. "DeWitt was the

only runner for us at State last

year, so he's the only one for us

"We had some physical problems at the end that cost us a lot of points," King emphasized. "That's a shame, because the girls really had a good year." King had praise for Elkins and
