

### An Exceptional "Motor"

When the third man in the final of the 1973 European Cup 5,000 m crossed the finish line, his West German teammates rushed forward to shake his hand This was the end of the racing career of Harald Norpoth, which had lasted more then ten years. The champion had warned them before this last race, "I'm tired of running for results. I want to run for pleasure, I'm through."

Norpoth, who had been second in the 5,000 m at the Tokyo Olympic Games, outdistancing the American Bill Dellinger and Michel Jazy, was the last person anyone expected to run for pleasure. His whole career had seemed like torture.

Although he was alarmingly skinny, Harald Norpoth had extraordinary physical capacities: the volume of his heart. 73.2 cubic inches, was twice the norm. and his lung capacity was about 7 quarts. And so on. But parts of him were not up to this exceptional "motor": his liver, his stomach, his knees. Norpoth was never altogether well. This did not keep him, however, from winning race after race, almost always using the same tactics: follow the field, then pass it on the last lap. These were not tactics which made him very popular, but they were tactics for which he was very well prepared. His training, under Dr Van Aaken, had consisted of hours and hours of running at a gentle pace. "Given the competitive edge of the American Steve Prefontaine. Harald could have been the first to run the 5,000 m in under 13 minutes," said Van Aaken
