Paul Pilgrim, of the New York Athletic Club, and the star athlete of the Seventh Regiment, N. Y.

G., is a clever runner at both the quarter and half miles.

Pilgrim was a member of the 1906 and of the 1908 Olympic team. His greatest victory—a performance which has been equalled by only one other athlete—was the winning of both the 400 and 800-meter races at Athens in 1906. Before these events Americans had lost all hope through the injury of Harry Hillman, upon whom they had relied to capture the 400-meter race. Pilgrim was the dark horse, nobody giving him a chance for first prize, but he upset all the calculations of the experts by coming home a winner in both events, defeating the great Halswell, the Pride of England, in each race.
